## "The Difference a Dad Can Make"

I find myself thinking a lot about the role of a dad lately. This past Father's Day, God asked me to do something unusual. I was prompted to sing a solo for my dad as he sat among the inmates at our Living Stone Service. (Note-the backstory to this is that dad always wanted me to sing in my younger days, but I refused) I sang George Strait's classic song about fatherhood, "Love Without End, Amen". I got through the song all right, the congregation was very enthusiastic, and dad was shocked. According to my mother, his face was glowing during the song. After the service, he gave me a note (cancer had impaired dad's voice for over a year) that said, "I was right, you can sing!". (Thanks for the encouragement Dad, I'm very sure Simon Cowell would have blasted me.)

This has become a very important memory for me, as we had to say our earthly goodbyes to my dad just a month later. Amid the emotions of the past few days, I have a stark awareness of how blessed I am. I wanted more time with my dad, but for over 40 years I knew the love of a father when so many others have never experienced that. Dad gave me a good example to follow. There are many who have had nothing but a chaotic blueprint for life from the examples they've had. I've met with countless men who would have had a similar checklist to the one penned by a foster child in Oklahoma (on the backside of this newsletter), which describes what was desired in a family. One man I've been counseling, has one good memory from his childhood, it was of a woman who was kind to him at a cabin he was at, giving him a blanket and a cup of hot chocolate. His other memories are strewn with abuse and utter instability. He was given no example of how to be a man. Sadly, he continued the cycle of abuse into adulthood, finding his own victims. He says justice was done when he was sent to prison, but I just can't help but think it would have been much different for him if he'd had half the dad that I did.

We had the opportunity this past June, to partner with an organization called Proverbs 226 that is attacking the vicious cycle of incarceration. According to their research, 82% of children whose parents are in prison will one day be incarcerated themselves. Not to

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mention the greater risk of drug use, dropping out of high school, abstract poverty and many other conditions that contribute to a struggling existence. On Saturday, June 23 we took part in an event that Proverbs 226 put on at Mike Durfee, in which the children of the inmates involved, came into the prison and had the opportunity to extend their father forgiveness for their absence in their lives. We also prayed over the families and witnessed reconciliation happening right before our eyes.

We at Living Stone, believe along with Proverbs 226 that the cycle of brokenness and incarceration can be stopped in Jesus Name. Having a dad that you know loves you, even if they are in prison, can make a huge difference.

If you've experienced the love of a father, count yourself blessed. God gave me the great gift of having such a dad. I now choose to use that gift to reach out in love to others who have had a fatherhood void in their life.

We appreciate your prayers and financial support as we follow the Holy Spirit's lead in breaking the cycle.
