He stormed out of the doors of the halfway house where he'd been living. Vulgarities and other malicious words flew out of his mouth aimed at someone he was obviously very angry with. I watched as he walked down the sidewalk still swearing and discerned that now was not a good time to try and engage him in conversation.

Three days later, another man walked into the doors of the Freedom's Gate church building just prior to the Sunday service starting. I was standing in the hallway towards the backside, squinting to see who it was as I was partially blinded by the sun coming through the glass doors behind him. I turned to the person beside me and said in a surprised tone, "Is that Harry*?" (*name changed)

Sin... the thing sinners do, the thing a Pastor like me warns about, the thing all of us struggle with, and many times try to hide from others. Sin... the thing Jesus came to this earth to remove from our life so we can be forgiven and free from its consequences.

Sinners... people Jesus had compassion for, people Jesus came to save, people that Jesus befriended and forgave, people Jesus intentionally hung out with. In fact, when the Pharisees grumbled and complained that Jesus was hanging out with sinners, the Master Teacher responded this way, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." (Luke 5:31-32)

The relationship between those with obvious or ongoing sin and the church has been a shaky one historically. One person who was struggling was asked if they'd gone to church for help. They responded by saying: "The church? Why would I go to church? I feel bad enough the way it is. The people there would just make me feel worse!"

That situation happened in another state so I cannot speak for the church in question. I think it's sad that anyone would avoid God's people in their struggles instead of looking to the church for grace and direction in whatever ails them. A quote often attributed to Saint Augustine goes like this, "The church is not a museum for saints, it is a hospital for sinners."

We at Freedom's Gate and Living Stone Prison Church hope to be that hospital for sinners in which the Great Physician does His spiritual surgery on those with hearts sickened by sin and returns them to spiritual vitality through both Grace and loving correction. It seems like people are getting that memo.

The angry man whose outburst I'd witnessed, was standing in the sanctuary as we sang Amazing Grace together at Freedom's Gate the following Sunday. I wondered if he knew I'd seen his behavior the Thursday before. I was thankful that he came even if he did.

I was surprised to see "Harry" at Freedom's Gate because it had been reported to me that he had gone on a drug bender and landed in jail (again) just a couple days earlier, but there he was in the front row as I preached about how God's arms can reach us in the deepest of selfmade pits. Earlier in the service he had requested prayer for those struggling with their addictions, including himself.

Both men had reasons why they might have avoided worship out of shame, and yet there they were which made my heart glad.

We fully realize that not every church body is prepared to take on the challenges of having a congregation with a high percentage of former inmates and addicts, some of whom are still struggling with addiction and iniquity of other kinds. However, I am also fully aware that there are those struggling with sin in many forms within every body of believers. I implore you to make every effort to welcome in those in your congregation who may be tempted to flee when their sin becomes obvious and maybe even public knowledge. For the sin and for the sinner, the medicine needed to bring people back to health is found in the pharmacy of the church and not apart from it. Jesus is the Great

Physician, and we are his assistants. If the message we are sending reads only of condemnation and judgement, we can expect the sick to try and find "medicine" somewhere else which will harm instead of heal.

We are thankful for all those who partner with us to provide a place that both sinners and saints find the Grace and Truth for the journey of life!
